Stop AAPI Hate is a U.S.-based coalition dedicated to tackling racism and discrimination against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAs & PIs). We strive to advance the multiracial movement for equity and justice by building power for our communities, working in solidarity with other communities of color, and advocating for comprehensive solutions that tackle the root causes of race-based hate.

As the nation's largest reporting center tracking anti-AA/PI hate acts, our coalition publishes data insights and research findings to paint a vivid and nuanced picture of racism and other forms of bigotry as it is experienced by our communities. Leveraging our [core strategies](#)—Data & Research, Policy & Advocacy, Community Care, and Strategic Communications & Narrative Change—we drive progress across four distinct issue areas to create a safer, more equitable future for all.

A WORD FROM OUR FOUNDERS

This year marks Stop AAPI Hate's five-year anniversary, and we are deeply proud of what we've achieved together with your support. Since our founding, we have remained the nation's largest reporting center for tracking anti-AA/PI hate and a trusted resource for community members and policymakers. We shine a light on the experiences of discrimination against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in ways no other organization has before.

Thanks to your generosity, in 2024 we expanded our national work as we:

- **Fought unlawful land ownership bans** that target Asian immigrants and leveraged our "Stop The Blame" campaign to prevent the restoration of the dangerous China Initiative.
- **Assessed the state of hate** through our annual national survey, providing critical data to advocate for resources that protect our communities.
- **Highlighted the rise in hate** against South Asians through a groundbreaking report.
- **Demanded police accountability** for the killings of AA/PI people.
- **Shared stories of pride and resilience** through "Spread AAPI Love," our national storytelling campaign for AA/PI Heritage Month.

As we reflect on our achievements, we have also prepared for the challenges ahead. With Trump back in the White House wasting no time in attacking immigrants and LGBTQ communities and dismantling diversity, equity, and inclusion policies, we're mobilizing against the onslaught of hateful rhetoric and policies that threaten our safety and undermine our humanity. **We remember, all too vividly, the hate and violence he ignited throughout his first term.** Our coalition was forged in 2020 as a direct response to the hatred and violence fueled by President Trump—his racist rhetoric, his policies that tore families apart, and his blatant attempts to erase our histories from classrooms.

Today, our work is still CRUCIAL and our coalition is stronger and more prepared to fight for justice and a multiracial democracy. Our data shows that 49% of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders were victims of a hate act in 2023.



STATE OF ANTI-AA/PI HATE

Almost half (49%) of AA/PI adults experienced an act of hate in 2023 due to their race, ethnicity, or nationality— a reminder that hate remains pervasive across AA/PI communities. Most hate acts involved some form of harassment (85%)—while 51% involved institutional discrimination and 26% of hate acts involved physical contact or harm.

STOP AAPI HATE TIMELINE

2020

- Established the Stop AAPI Hate reporting center in response to rising COVID-related acts of anti-AA/PI hate
- Released [initial data and research](#) calling attention to anti-Chinese rhetoric and the impacts of President Trump’s use of “China virus” and “kung flu”
- Advised the Biden presidential transition team on anti-AA/PI hate

Established reporting center

2021

- Published national research on the ongoing rise of anti-Asian hate—days and weeks before mass shootings in [Atlanta](#) and [Indianapolis](#) claim 16 lives

- Testified before Congress at the House Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties

FIVE YEARS OF STOP AAPI HATE

STATE OF ANTI-AA/PI HATE

Anti-Asian threats observed in violent, extremist online spaces reached a high in August 2024, with **75% of the threats directed at South Asian communities**—coinciding with the ascendance of South Asian political figures, including Kamala Harris and Usha Vance.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

BY STRATEGIC AREA

DATA & RESEARCH

Stop AAPI Hate provides a safe, anonymous platform in 17 languages for community members to report anti-AA/PI hate acts. Our reporting center is widely recognized as the primary resource for reliable data on anti-AA/PI community hate act reports. We provide real-time data and trend analysis to researchers, community partners, government agencies, journalists, and the public. To date, we have documented over 12,700 reports of hate since 2020.

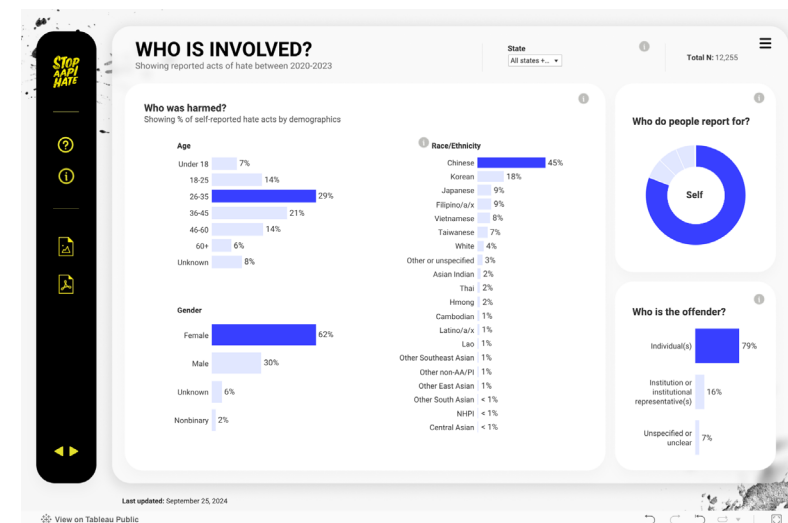
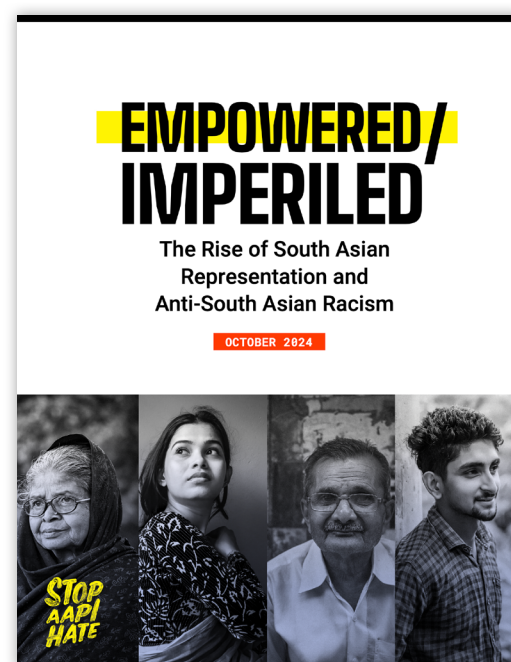


State of Hate Report

"From Pain to Power" combines key insights from our first annual nationally representative survey with data from our reporting center to examine how hate is experienced, its impact, and key motivators for political action and civic engagement. It is the most comprehensive survey on anti-AA/PI hate ever conducted. More than 200 people attended a briefing to learn about the report.

South Asian Report

In collaboration with members of the Samosa Caucus, we launched the groundbreaking report "[Empowered/Imperiled](#)," our first research to focus on a single AA/PI subgroup. It took a closer look at the dual rise of South Asian political representation and anti-South Asian online hate ahead of the 2024 U.S. elections



Data Visualization Tool

Over 50,000 researchers, journalists, academics, and others have engaged with our interactive [data tool](#) to explore the community-generated data from our reporting center. It includes the ability to compare by age, gender, and reporting language and to filter by geographic location.

A TRUSTED RESOURCE

We remain a trusted source of data and research about hate and discrimination against AA/PIs. Our data continues to be cited at congressional hearings and in the media. In a recent report, AAPI Data commended our "Shades of Hate" report for its importance and conceptual clarity in establishing a common taxonomy for understanding hate experiences.



POLICY & ADVOCACY

Stop AAPI Hate advocates for national, state, and local policy solutions that enhance community safety, improve the reporting of hate acts, and increase access to healing resources for victims, survivors, and communities. We continue to hold elected officials accountable and lead campaigns to strengthen civil rights protections, improve government practices, and increase resources for data-driven, non-carceral solutions.

Stop The Blame

Through this [national campaign](#) against scapegoating, we fought unlawful land bans that target Asian immigrants in Georgia, Florida, and Texas—and opposed the restoration of the dangerous China Initiative, which fueled racial profiling of Chinese Americans.



Justice for Victims of Police Violence

Stop AAPI Hate joined a community rally for Victoria Lee, a Korean American woman who was experiencing a mental health crisis when she was fatally shot by police in New Jersey, to honor her life and to call on political leaders to invest in alternative solutions outside of policing to keep people safe. We launched a petition with AAPI New Jersey calling for a full investigation into Victoria's death.

We also brought attention to others who died at the hands of police like Nyah Mway, Yong Yang, and Win Rozario. Together with local organizations, we fought for increased investment in mental health resources, new protocols to reduce police involvement in mental health crises, and legislative reforms.

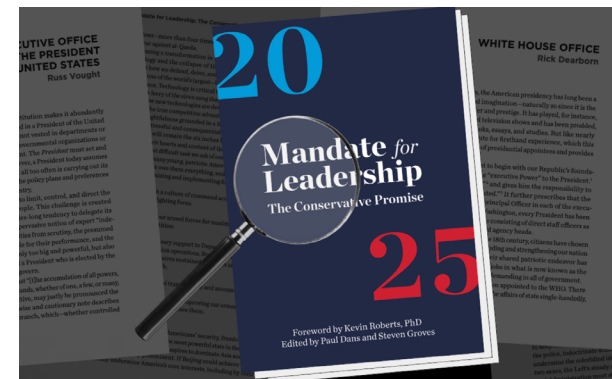

Offenders and Defenders

Our [monthly newsletter](#) rounds up the worst acts of anti-Asian scapegoating in U.S. politics—and the political leaders who call it out when it matters most. In the final weeks before Election Day, we saw a slew of disinformation and anti-immigrant rhetoric.



Government Partnerships

We advised government agencies and policymakers and met with elected officials to provide insights on the impact of potential legislation on AA/PI communities. In 2024, we worked with the California State Transportation Agency, LA Metro, BART, and SF Municipal Transportation Agency to address harassment on public transit. We counseled the California Civil Rights Department on their “Welcome In” pilot program, which incentivizes businesses to create safe and welcoming environments. We also advised Congressman Al Green (D-TX); Texas State Representative Gene Wu; and members of the Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus, chaired by Congresswoman Judy Chu (D-CA).



Project 2025 Analysis

We read all 900+ pages of Project 2025 and released a [comprehensive analysis](#) that warns of the impact of Project 2025 on AA/PI communities. A summary of our findings is available in four languages.

COMMUNITY CARE

Stop AAPI Hate believes that healing and community care are powerful—and necessary—responses to hate. We support those who have been directly impacted by anti-AA/PI hate through crisis response. Across the country, we connect victims and survivors to culturally sensitive support services from local providers and resources from government agencies.

Radical Healing Pilot Program

In partnership with AAPI Equity Alliance, we launched a pilot program to foster healing and civic engagement among individuals in Southern California who have reported hate acts to Stop AAPI Hate. We plan to expand this program to other states.

It has profoundly affected me on a deep, personal level, providing me with invaluable tools and insights that have empowered me to navigate life’s challenges with greater resilience and clarity. I have experienced a noticeable improvement in my overall sense of happiness and fulfillment, as well as a reduction in feelings of stress and anxiety.

A Steady Resource for Community Members

We supported 35 individuals who reached out to us for help with discrimination, harassment, vandalism, and other forms of hate by validating their experiences and making referrals to organizations and agencies that provide direct services.

Understanding Hate Through One-On-Ones

Since 2022, we have interviewed over 200 people—including more than 76 in 2024—who used our reporting center. Through these conversations, we gained insight into how hate acts affected them and what support would have been helpful at the time and now. These interviews shape our work.

POST-ELECTION RAPID RESPONSE

Our coalition has been preparing to protect our communities from the threats posed by Trump and his administration of loyalists, including their plans to carry out inhumane mass deportations that will fuel family separation and racial profiling against AA/PIs. In response to Trump’s reelection, we mobilized to push against harmful policies and educate people on the attempts to strip us of our rights and freedoms.



Town Hall

After the election, we held a virtual town hall, “Uniting Against Hate and Defending our Communities,” bringing together more than 350 movement leaders, elected officials, and everyday people to discuss the threats of Trumpism and how we can mobilize against it. Panelists included Senator Andy Kim and leaders from AA/PI, Black, and Indigenous community organizations.

Multilingual Resources

We compiled [multilingual information](#) to educate community members about their rights and connect them to resources. This includes **Know Your Rights** information for immigrants, protesters, and anyone interacting with law enforcement; fact-checking sites in Asian languages; guidelines for confronting mis/disinformation; and mental health assistance.

Opposing the “Nonprofit Killer” Bill

We joined other organizations to fight against H.R. 9495, which would allow the Trump administration to unilaterally designate a nonprofit as a “terrorist-supporting organization” and shut it down without due process.

移民保卫中心正在密切关注移民和海关执行署(ICE)在社区拘捕抓人的活动

了解你在海关移民法中的权利

谁有被移民局逮捕的危险呢

法律允许联邦政府驱逐某些移民，包括

- 任何没有合法移民身份的人
- 任何具有合法身份（像是合法的永久居民、难民和持有签证的人）但是有被定罪的人

联邦政府指示ICE（美国移民和海关执行署）他们的重点逮捕对象。ICE（美国移民和海关执行署）官员将决定优先逮捕那些他们声称：

- 对“国家安全”构成威胁；
- 在2020年11月1日或之后非法进入美国，或
- 对“公共安全”构成当前威胁的人。ICE会考虑以下几个因素：
- 个人近期的犯罪记录和警方的逮捕
- 任何涉及枪支或武器的指控

这些条件在拜登政府时期已经变更了两次，而且可能会再次更改。即使你认为自己不符合这些重点逮捕对象的条件，如果你有被驱逐出境的可能性，ICE（美国移民和海关执行署）仍然可以决定逮捕你。

任何具有合法身份但是先前被定罪的人

请注意：你可能是移民局官员的目标，虽然

- 你的定罪发生在好几年前
- 你没有坐过牢
- 你所见的案件是次要或轻罪
- 你持有永久居留权已有很长一段时间
- 你的家人都是美国公民

移民官员不会靠近盘问任何他们认为可能被驱逐出境？

移民官员会事先找出他们认为可以逮捕的人，然后他们会到住所、法院、收容中心甚至工作地点去找这些人。有时候移民官员会在街上当场逮捕。

如果我有这些风险应该如何处理？

- 制定一个计划 和你的家人商量一个对策，万一你被移民官员抓走
- 不要跟移民有任何接触 不要申请改变移民身份或是更新绿卡，而且不要在没跟移民律师商讨前出境
- 避免接触刑事司法机关（警方和移民署都有你的指纹资料）

拟定一个计划如果你或是亲人有可能被驱逐出境

With over 400,000 subscribers across our digital channels, Stop AAPI Hate has the ability to amplify AA/PI voices and the issues that impact our communities.

Spread AAPI Love

This [multimedia campaign](#) launched during AA/PI Heritage Month in May to raise the voices of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders through everyday stories of resilience, celebration, solidarity, and resistance. Informed by [our research](#), which shows that AA/PIs are more motivated by positive aspirations, actions, and feelings than they are by experiences with hate, we created this campaign to drive narrative change and foster community healing.

Holding the Media Accountable

On July 13, 2024 the New York Post published a false story that wrongly reported that a “Chinese man” was responsible for the assassination attempt on Donald Trump. Together with community partners, we immediately demanded a formal retraction and apology, recognizing the real-life consequences this misinformation poses to our safety. Three days later, the paper issued a correction and apology.

STATE OF ANTI-AA/PI HATE

Hate has a tremendous impact on our well-being, with **43% of people who experienced hate reporting negative effects to their physical and/or mental health.** 72% of those who experienced hate reported feeling stressed frequently compared to 54% who did not experience hate.

THE FUTURE

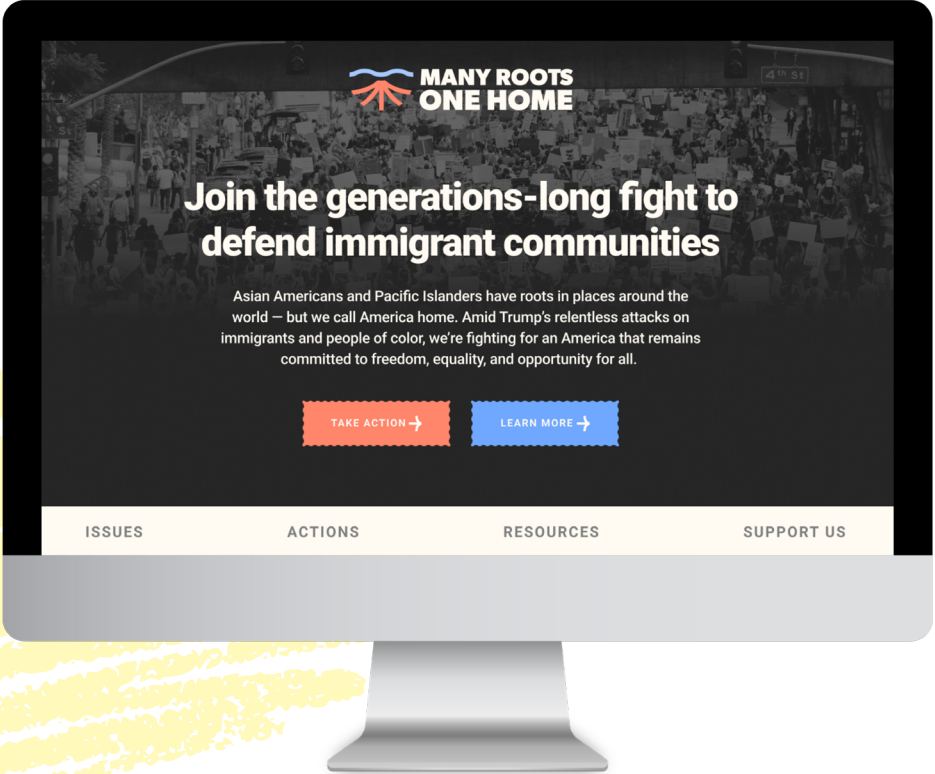
Our work marches onward. Although we face a dark and dangerous time, we have been here before. Generations before us organized, resisted, and supported one another. We draw on that deep history to strategize ways to protect our communities. We will marshal our resources and collective power to fight for our rights and defend democracy.

In the year ahead, we will continue our advocacy work, collaborating with allied organizations across the country to push back against the extreme anti-immigrant policies that separate families, scapegoat immigrants, and sow fear and instability in our communities. We will continue to monitor the state of hate through our next annual survey and develop a report that’s focused on Pacific Islanders.

Our teams will also focus on education. While we’ve made strides in changing the narrative around anti-AA/PI hate, emerging threats demand new strategies to defend civil rights and ultimately defeat attempts to marginalize AA/PI communities. This includes working with the REACH coalition in New York to ensure that AA/PI history is taught in schools.

Our latest initiative, “[Many Roots, One Home](#),” responds to these urgent challenges by focusing on immigrant rights and narrative change to counter systemic hate and exclusion. The goals of this initiative include shifting public opinion to support inclusive and humane immigration policies, and developing training and resources to equip AA/PI communities for collective action and advocacy.

Together we will create a path forward towards a just world. We are deeply grateful to our current and past supporters, and countless individual donors, who have empowered us to establish and grow over the past five years.

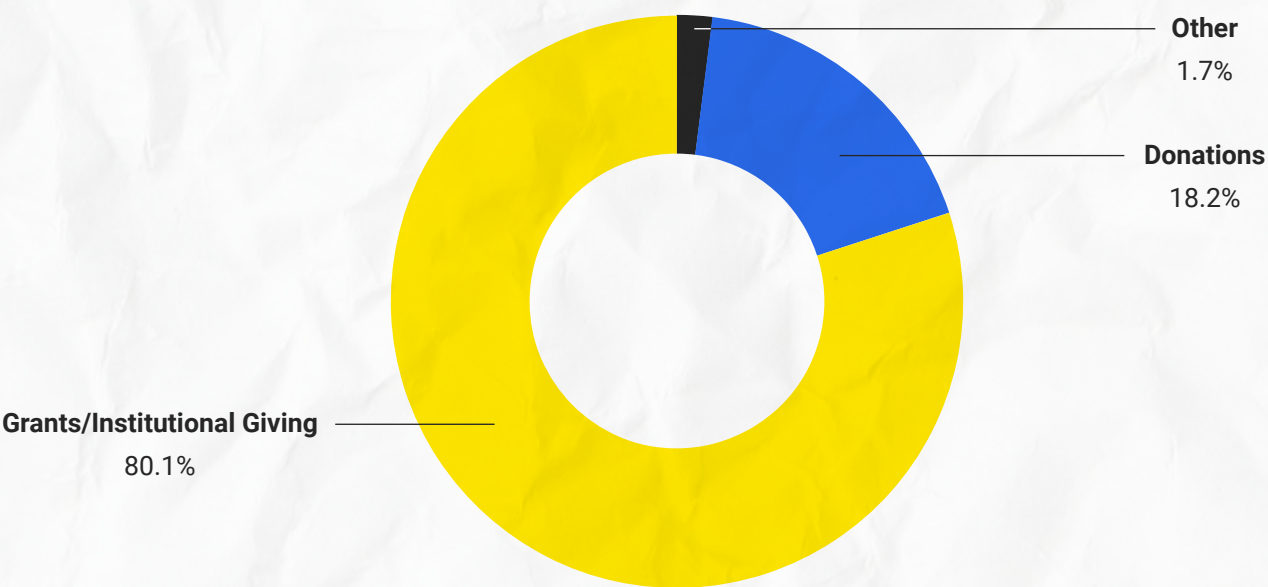

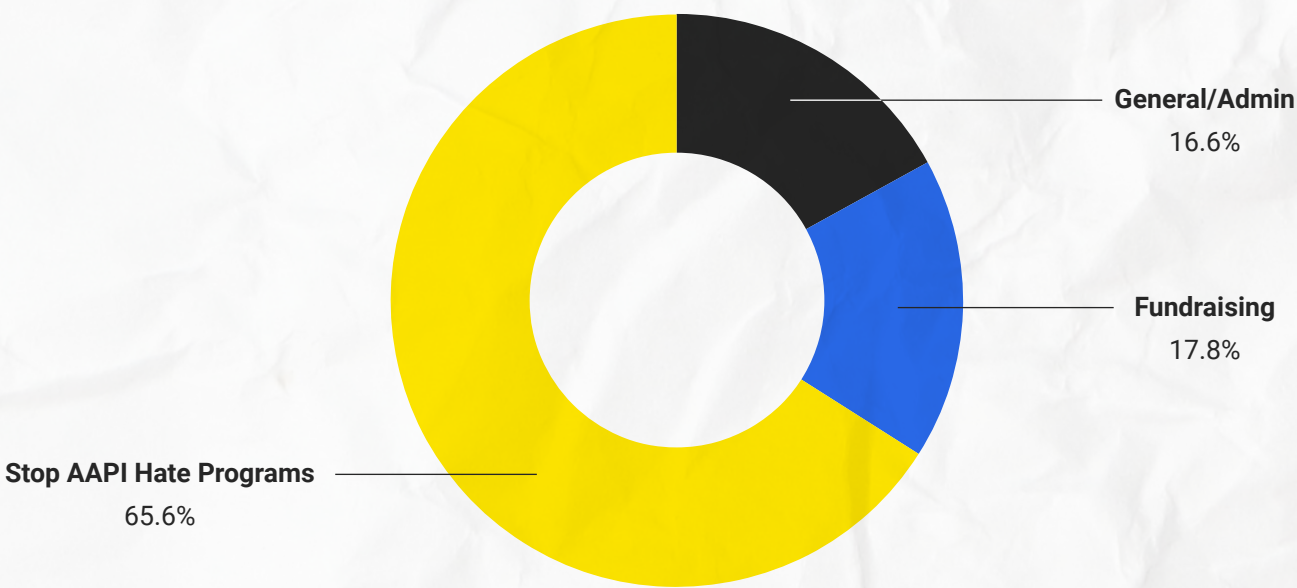
